# Director's Message

## Vanessa Ho

**Executive Director** 



2024 was marked by public outrage over the <u>Samsui woman controversy</u>. A mural by artist Sean Dunston was condemned for allegedly sexualising a national icon—her "crime": holding a cigarette. This moment starkly revealed how deeply entrenched caricatures of sex workers remain. A single lit cigarette was enough to collapse an identity into a stereotype.

That caricature was reinforced later in the year when a Straits Times reporter went <u>undercover</u> to secretly record migrant women in Geylang, violating their consent, privacy and right of response.

Amid this noise, a brothel with nearly 30 years of history quietly shut its doors due to rising rent and disputes with the landlord. Over two weeks, a dozen local transgender sex workers lost their livelihoods. Attempts to secure a new space failed, and those who once held a visible place in our history faded into invisibility.

Whether or not society acknowledges it, sex work exists—and so will Project X. Our mission remains unwavering: to support, advocate for, and stand beside sex workers in Singapore.

In 2024, we continued providing direct services through our sexual and reproductive health programmes, the *Next Step* programme for those exploring exit options, and our art and talk therapy sessions. We bid farewell to our peer educator Tracy and welcomed Nayla—a long-time community member—into our outreach team.

Our commitment to hiring sex workers as peer leaders saw the addition of Lisa to the team of two (Ivy and Meedee). Together, the team has managed to reach out to different segments of the sex work industry, and collectively organised 10 community events across various themes (Page 23 -25).

# Director's Message

We continued documenting human rights violations through our case management system and raised systemic issues via Parliamentary Questions, closed-door dialogues (AICHR, NHPC, TIP), and international mechanisms like CEDAW (Page 29). Our 16-year commitment to being an evidence-based, and voice for sex workers led to us being invited to provide an expert statement for a Singaporean trans sex worker's successful asylum application in Europe.

Our work would not be possible without the support of our donors who funding us directly, organising fundraising events, or collaborating to access grants (Page 32). And our volunteers and interns whose contributions have directly impacted the lives of the community through their friendship, allyship, and efforts to challenge stigma and discrimination. As we move forward, we continue to invite you, your friends, and your companies to stand with us. Speak up against stigma. Challenge injustice where you see it. And support our work however you can—through donations, partnerships, or simply by listening with compassion.

Together, we can build a society where sex workers are treated with fairness and respect, and feel safe to access life-saving services.

# Sexual Health Outreach



## Sexual Health Outreach and Peer Educators

Through our sex worker movement, we support global efforts to **end HIV transmission**. Sex workers, a key population at risk, face barriers to healthcare. At Project X, we provide **free** HIV/STI testing in affirming, non-judgemental spaces.



We couldn't have done this without our Peer Educators. Peer educators are a key resource of Project X. With experiences in the sex and entertainment industries, they are able to help Project X reach out to communities hidden in the margins and bridge access to our services such as sexual health programmes, anti-violence programmes and our Next Step programme.

This year, we strengthened our Peer Educator Programme by introducing a new code of conduct to guide them in navigating the challenges they may face in their work.

## 2024 Annual Sexual Health Survey Insights The Annual Sexual Health survey is conducted every year to evaluate the effectiveness of Project X Society's

outreach programmes and community events in raising sexual health literacy among sex workers in the past year. This year, we surveyed a total of 400 respondents on their sexual health knowledge.



## 2024 Annual Sexual Health Survey Insights

## Health Seeking Behaviours

Overall, there is a notable increase in the proportion of respondents who used condoms and went for a HIV test. However, there was a drop in the proportion of respondents who went for STI screening.

### 1. Communities have various levels of awareness on different topics

• There is a need to strengthen knowledge related to HIV (e.g. PEP and PrEP), as many workers felt that this was important

2. To continue outreach to different communities so we are better aware of the issues faced and different priorities



## Casework

Project X began our case management system in 2015. To date, we have assisted over **800** sex workers in distress. Of the 400 sex workers surveyed for our annual sexual health survey, **22.5%** of sex workers reported either being physically hurt and/or being tricked/deceived/threatened into having sex. Discrimination and stigma against sex workers perpetuates violence against them. They should be protected from violence, and through our work at Project X, we strive to ensure their access to justice.

## 

Sex workers came to us for assistance because:

1. They didn't know who to turn to

2. They were afraid of accessing mainstream services for fear of legal repercussions

3. Mainstream services did not cater to their needs

# The Next Step Programme

The Next Step is a social work programme funded by the National Council of Social Service that supports sex workers who wish to upskill or seek employment outside the sex industry.

TNS offers two tracks: clients can choose to take a course to upskill or follow the employment track. We currently partner with six employers and training providers who understand our clients' backgrounds and needs, and who offer supportive opportunities to explore different types of employment. This process allowed programme participants to explore their strengths and areas for growth, gaining valuable insights about themselves through handson experience.

# Advocacy

## March

Mr Louis Ng's Parliamentary Questions regarding the detection of abuse of sex workers.

In-person meeting with Singapore Inter-Agency Taskforce on Trafficking in Persons, a taskforce that is cochaired by Ministry of Home Affairs and Ministry of Manpower.
